PERFORMANCE AUDIT REPORT
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JANUARY 1, 2016 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2017

Dear Mr. Smith and Warden Harper:

We have conducted a performance audit to evaluate the compliance of Goodwill of Southwestern Pennsylvania ("Goodwill") with the terms and provisions of its Allegheny County contracts #134369 and #200054 for alternative housing services at the Allegheny County Jail. Our performance audit covers the period from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017, and was performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our engagement, we determined that Goodwill invoiced the County for \$140 in excess compensation, but otherwise appears to have complied with the significant compliance requirements contained in the alternative housing service contracts and the Allegheny County Jail policies applicable to alternative housing service providers. The detailed results of our performance audit are included in the attached report.

I. Introduction

Goodwill is a nonprofit corporation that has provided a variety of social services in the greater Pittsburgh area for many years. Allegheny County contracts with Goodwill to provide alternative housing work release services for male inmates. The alternative housing program was initiated to address overcrowding at the Allegheny County Jail and to offer the criminal justice system an alternative to probation, supervision, and long-term security confinements.

Goodwill's alternative housing program was designed to provide a structured, supervised facility that prepares inmates for reintegration into society as responsible citizens. Goodwill's inmate population includes up to 50 male inmates from the Allegheny County Jail, all of whom must be medically cleared, non-violent, and low risk inmates 18 years of age or older with a remaining sentence of less than one year. Potential alternative housing program participants may be referred by a sentencing judge or identified by Goodwill as possible candidates for the program. The Jail will consider these candidates and either approve or deny the inmates for transfer to Goodwill. Goodwill did not contract to house any State or Federal inmates during the period to which we applied our procedures.

All inmates at Goodwill's alternative housing facility are expected to remain drug and alcohol free and obtain additional education or secure employment. In addition, inmates referred by the Criminal Division must apply 10% of their net pay towards any outstanding costs, fines, or restitution they might owe. Inmates referred by the Family Division must apply 40% of their net pay toward child support arrearages until they obtain wage attachable employment. All inmates must apply 20% of their net pay to Goodwill for room and board. Upon receiving a paycheck, an inmate is to remit the entire net pay to Goodwill. Goodwill then withholds any amounts due for room and board and any costs, fines, restitution, and/or child support as applicable. The balance of an inmate's net pay is remitted to the inmate by Goodwill via check. It is Goodwill's responsibility to remit all amounts collected to the appropriate governmental entity. The amount collected for room and board by Goodwill is used to reduce the amount billed to Allegheny County under the agreement.

Allegheny County entered into contract #134369 with Goodwill for the period March 1, 2012 through February 28, 2015. Contract #134369 was first extended for a 10-month period to December 31, 2015, and then extended again for an additional year to December 31, 2016. Under contract #134369, Goodwill was entitled to compensation of \$59 per day per bed for up to 50 beds occupied by County inmates.

Allegheny County entered into contract #200054 with Goodwill for the period January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2019. Under contract #200054, Goodwill is entitled to compensation of \$70 per day per bed for up to 49 beds occupied by County inmates.

Goodwill provided alternative housing services for 237 and 236 County inmates during 2017 and 2016. Goodwill's gross billings for the alternative housing services provided were \$1,117,340 and \$917,096 in 2017 and 2016. These gross billings were reduced by \$55,107 and \$45,685 in room and board payments that Goodwill collected from the

inmates during 2017 and 2016, respectively, to arrive at net billings of 1,062,233 and 1,062,233

Objectives

The objectives of our performance audit were to:

- 1. Determine whether inmates participating in the alternative housing program at Goodwill during the audit period were referred to the program by the Allegheny County Jail and met the eligibility requirements for program participation.
- 2. To determine whether inmates participating in the program were employed and were properly (periodically) monitored while at their work release sites.
- 3. To evaluate the effectiveness of Goodwill's controls over the administration of inmate medications, including the disposal of unused medications.
- 4. To determine whether inmate funds have been handled and accounted for properly by Goodwill, including the transfer of inmate account balances from the Jail, the distribution and tracking of funds inmates earn through employment, and the ultimate distribution of funds (or escheating to the Commonwealth of PA).
- 5. To determine whether Goodwill had adequate controls in place to ensure that inmates did not leave the alternative housing facilities without proper authorization, to track and monitor inmates who were permitted to leave the facilities, and to make all of the required notifications in a timely fashion if inmates escaped.
- 6. To determine whether Goodwill was in compliance with the contract terms regarding the number of inmates served, amounts billed for services, insurance coverage, and reporting requirements.

Scope

Our audit procedures covered the period from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017. We conducted our performance audit in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives.

Methodology

Methodologies used to accomplish our objectives included, but were not limited to the following:

- Reviewed contracts #134369 and #200054, the Allegheny County Jail's policies applicable to alternative housing programs, the *Goodwill Center Handbook*, and other relevant documents.
- Interviewed Goodwill and Allegheny County Jail personnel to gain an understanding of contract operation, including internal control we deemed significant to our audit objectives.
- Reviewed the most recent contract compliance report issued by the Controller's Office Audit Division and evaluated the implementation status of our prior recommendations.
- Verified (on a test basis) that inmates met the established eligibility requirements for participation in the alternative housing program, including the required analysis of the nature of the inmates' criminal offenses.
- Examined case files, head counts, invoices, and other records of Goodwill relevant to the administration of the alternative housing contracts to assess Goodwill's compliance with the contracts and to determine whether Goodwill was only compensated for the services it provided.
- Applied procedures (on a test basis) to assess whether inmate funds were handled and accounted for properly. These procedures addressed the initial transfers of inmate account balances from the Allegheny County Jail, the proper allocation and distribution of funds that inmates earned through employment, and the ultimate distribution of funds to inmates who are no longer participants in the alternative housing program.
- Analyzed Goodwill's policies and procedures pertaining to inmate medications and evaluated the effectiveness of the actual implementation of those policies and procedures during the audit period.
- Assessed Goodwill's monitoring of inmates who participate in activities outside
 of the alternative housing facility and its compliance with the directives and
 policies in effect that impose requirements on alternative housing facilities in the
 event of walkaways or escapes from the facilities.

We performed these procedures during February and March of 2018. We provided a draft copy of this report to Goodwill of Southwestern Pennsylvania for response. Goodwill's response begins on page 9.

Finding #1

Goodwill Invoiced the Jail \$140 in Excess Compensation for the Alternative Housing Services Provided

Criteria: Section 2.G. of Allegheny County contract #200054 for alternative

housing services indicates that Goodwill's monthly invoices to the County should be reduced by the amount of income received by Goodwill as room and board payments paid by the inmates to

Goodwill.

Condition: Goodwill's invoice for the month of March 2017 reflected a gross

billable amount for the alternative housing services provided of \$85,120 and room and board payments collected from inmates during the month of March of \$4,481. Based on this, the net amount of the invoice should have been \$80,639. However, the net amount of the invoice submitted for payment and ultimately paid by the County was \$80,779, \$140 in excess of the amount of

the compensation earned for the services provided.

Cause: We were advised that Goodwill identified the invoicing error and

prepared a revised invoice, but the original invoice was submitted

to the County for payment by mistake.

Effect: Goodwill invoiced for \$140 of compensation in excess of the

amount permitted by Allegheny County contract #200054 and

owes the County \$140.

Recommendations: Goodwill should immediately refund the balance due to the

Allegheny County Jail of \$140.

IV. Conclusion

During our audit we observed that Goodwill was generally in compliance with the requirements of its alternative housing contracts and the Allegheny County Jail policies applicable to alternative housing providers across all aspects of the administration of its alternative housing program. Goodwill should repay the excess compensation that was invoiced, and continue to administer its alternative housing program in compliance with its alternative housing contracts and applicable Jail policies.
