CALL TO ORDER AND ATTENDANCE

MS. INNAMORATO: With that, I will call the Jail Oversight Board Meeting to order for Thursday, August 7, 2025. We'll start with roll call starting on my right.

MS. GRIFFIN: Barbara Griffin.

MS. INNAMORATO: Sara Innamorato.

MS. HALLAM: Bethany Hallam.

MAN-E: Man-E.

MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you.

Moving on to Community Corrections Reports. Passages to Recovery.

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS REPORTS

MR. PRICE: Good evening, Board. Greg Price, Director of Operations at Passages to Recovery.

Current census numbers is 21. We had zero escapes, one revocation, two EMS transfers, zero use of force, zero self-injuries or self-harm nature, zero COVID cases, and zero people employed.

Any questions, concerns?

(No response.)

1 MR. PRICE: Nothing. Thank you.

2 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you.

3 MS. HALLAM: Thank you.

4 MS. INNAMORATO: Renewal Center.

5 MR. ZAK: Good evening. Adam Zak,
6 Case Manager, Supervisor of Renewal,
7 Incorporated.

8 We currently have 134 county
9 reentrants, 108 in our work release program, that
10 being 98 males, 10 females, and then 26 in our
11 Drug and Alcohol Program, 23 males and 3 females.

12 We have a current employment rate
13 of 67 percent with a mean pay rate of \$19 an
14 hour.

15 In July, we had 33 successful
16 completions, and we had 18 unsuccessful exits,
17 eight escapes and ten program revocations.

18 We had three occurrences when the
19 ambulance was called for county reentrants.

20 Also, in the past month, we had
21 zero deaths, zero non-fatal overdoses, zero use
22 of force incidents, zero self-harm incidents,
23 zero suicide attempts, and zero cases of COVID
24 for reentrants or staff.

25 And then finally, back in June, one

1 of our county reentrants won the Betty Esper
2 Scholarship sponsored by Renewal. The young man
3 received \$1,000 to go toward his schooling.
4 Betty Esper is the former mayor of Homestead, and
5 a former Mental Board Member, and she was on hand
6 to present him his scholarship.

7 MS. INNAMORATO: Any questions?
8 Member Hallam?

9 MS. HALLAM: Thank you.
10 The first thing is a comment. I
11 saw in -- you know, for the first time, the Clean
12 Team went out there. Is that the -- I forget the
13 name.

14 MR. ZAK: Yes.

15 MS. HALLAM: The Clean Team, yeah.
16 And they were so nice. They were like really
17 into what they were doing. I need you to thank
18 them for, you know, all the work that they were
19 doing outside, keeping the streets beautiful.
20 And so I just wanted to let you know, like, how
21 polite they were, how friendly they were. And,
22 like, they weren't just like that with me. They
23 were like that with other people I saw them
24 interacting with on the streets. Just really
25 excited about that program.

1 And then the second thing is, I
2 know at a previous meeting we had talked about
3 Renewal sending us the grievances from the county
4 folks in the facility and I haven't received any
5 yet. So I'm just wondering have there not been
6 any or what is the update on that? But I see
7 you're coming up. I'm guessing to answer that
8 question. Thank you.

9 MR. ZAK: I'm going to defer to our
10 Vice President.

11 MS. HALLAM: Thank you.

12 MR. JOHANSON: Yes. I'm Scott
13 Johanson, J-O-H-A-N-S-O-N, Executive VP, Renewal,
14 Inc.

15 Yeah, since the last meeting I had
16 some conversations with Karen Duffola, and she
17 was communicating with some of the Board Members.
18 And she asked me not to act on that request at
19 this time. So I was going to defer that to her
20 to respond, because I don't have any -- I reached
21 out to her prior to this meeting. That was the
22 response, so I'm still working through that
23 request with her.

24 MS. HALLAM: Yeah. I would love to
25 know why she is speaking for the Board when we

1 had agreed upon that at the last meeting.

2 MR. JOHANSON: I'm not trying to
3 get in the middle of anything.

4 MS. HALLAM: Okay. Yeah.

5 MR. JOHANSON: I'm just trying to
6 appease the Board but also work with the Board
7 Liaison. So I will let you know.

8 MS. HALLAM: But you understand
9 that the Board Liaison works for the Board and
10 the Board requested.

11 MR. JOHANSON: Yeah, I am aware.

12 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So --

13 MR. JOHANSON: I'm not trying to
14 get any type of riff or anything. I'm just
15 working through with Karen Duffola. And I can
16 communicate with her further. I was going to
17 defer to her. She's not here.

18 MS. HALLAM: She's here. So she
19 told you not to send them to us?

20 MS. DUFFOLA: (Inaudible.)

21 MS. HALLAM: That's what was just
22 said.

23 MS. DUFFOLA: (Inaudible.)

24 MR. JOHANSON: Yeah, that's right.

25 MS. HALLAM: Oh, that's what

1 happened?

2 MR. JOHANSON: Yes. I was asked
3 not to act on it at this time, yes. It's not to
4 forward any at this time.

5 MS. HALLAM: Okay. But you
6 understand that we have access to that and that
7 we requested it.

8 MR. JOHANSON: I'm aware.

9 MAN-E: Did they give you a reason
10 why?

11 MR. JOHANSON: I believe that we're
12 still working through the logistics, or maybe
13 not. I would -- I'm in the process of trying to
14 navigate what the expectations are. Either maybe
15 there's a need for a policy or something like
16 that. Okay?

17 MS. INNAMORATO: We do appreciate
18 your response to that, and it seems like
19 something we can work on internally between our
20 leadership team and the rest of the members.

21 MR. JOHANSON: Okay.

22 MS. INNAMORATO: And close that
23 gap. But thank you for your honest answer --

24 MR. JOHANSON: Okay.

25 MS. INNAMORATO: -- and providing

1 the information that you're able to.

2 MR. JOHANSON: Okay.

3 MS. HALLAM: Thank you very much.

4 MR. JOHANSON: All right.

5 MS. INNAMORATO: Any other
6 questions from Members?

7 (No response.)

8 MS. INNAMORATO: Okay. Electronic
9 Monitoring.

10 MR. ESSWEIN: Good evening, Board.
11 Steve Esswein for the Probation Department.

12 So for this reporting period, we
13 had 645 individuals in the program, 80
14 successfully completed, and 4 of them -- or 5 of
15 them, I'm sorry, were taken back for violations.

16 Any questions?

17 (No response.)

18 MR. ESSWEIN: All right. Thank
19 you.

20 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you.

21 We do not have any Board Action, so
22 we do not have Public Comment on Board Actions,
23 Item 3.

24 Because we do not have a quorum, we
25 also must skip the review of the Meeting Minutes

1 from July 3rd.

2 **OLD BUSINESS**

3 MS. INNAMORATO: And moving on to
4 Agenda Item 5, Old Business, do we have any
5 updates from any of our subcommittees?

6 Member Hallam.

7 MS. HALLAM: Thank you. I have
8 one. We, as the Incarcerated Individuals Welfare
9 Fund Subcommittee, of which I think I'm maybe the
10 only person here from right now, but we are
11 meeting with jail administration on Monday to
12 talk about the Medical Notification Policy. So
13 that's both lawyers -- attorneys being notified
14 about any medication situations for incarcerated
15 people, and also family members being notified
16 outside of just, hey, someone potentially may die
17 and trying to expand to make sure if someone is
18 in the hospital or if someone has any kind of
19 medical emergency that the people that are
20 worried about them can find out about it.

21 So we are meeting on Monday. It's
22 been a really productive dialog getting ready for
23 that meeting. And so I just wanted to announce
24 that that's kind of our project at the moment on
25 that subcommittee.

1 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you.

2 Member Griffin.

3 MS. GRIFFIN: I'll just add a note
4 on the Health Services Advisory Subcommittee.
5 Part of that mission involves oversight of food
6 services at the jail. Last month I met with the
7 Director of Food Services for Trinity, whose name
8 I can't remember at --

9 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Rocco.

10 MS. GRIFFIN: Rocco, yes. I've
11 been locked out of my e-mail, so I'm missing a
12 lot of information. But, yeah. So I did -- just
13 a little bit about how food is prepared,
14 nutrition issues and those kind of things. And
15 so I will circle back with some of the community
16 members, who I met with a couple months ago on
17 this issue, and update them on what I learned and
18 talk about next steps going forward.

19 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you.

20 Okay. There is no New Business for
21 this meeting, so I'll hand it over to the Warden
22 for his report.

23 **WARDEN'S REPORT**

24 WARDEN WINGARD: Good afternoon,
25 Board. I'm just going to go through a couple

1 items, not a lot.

2 First, we're going to introduce
3 Karen Kollar. Karen, some of you may know, may
4 not know. She is our new Deputy for
5 Administration. I'm going to let her introduce
6 herself. Karen has taken the lead the last
7 several months before she ever got this position
8 with our Community Service we've been doing at
9 the facility. I was going to -- hopefully she
10 can expound on that a little bit and introduce
11 herself. Karen.

12 MS. KOLLAR: Thank you. Karen,
13 Deputy Warden of Administration. DWA, that
14 sounds so exciting. Thank you, everybody.

15 We've been doing community service
16 for the last few months, since June, and we
17 started with People's of Oakland, and we've been
18 doing a series, their picnic series. We help
19 them set up. We help them set up games. We meet
20 with their clients. We MC. We also clean up,
21 help serve. There was a little gardening, little
22 grill cleaning. We are full-service as long as
23 we can do it. From that, there's some nice
24 things that came out of that.

25 First of all, it was, oh, you work

1 for the jail and everybody would run. And now
2 it's more inquisitive, what do you do at the
3 jail? So it's nice building relationships. And
4 there's several people here that have
5 participated with us.

6 We also noticed that our employees
7 are coming to me to say this is community service
8 that they're doing, and maybe we can volunteer in
9 some of those projects. So in October, I'm sure
10 people have heard of Mission of Mercy, so we are
11 trying to set up an opportunity for people to
12 sign up to volunteer for that, free dental,
13 hearing and vision clinic that's happening
14 October 24th and 25th. So far we have one
15 sign-up so that's awesome. People are really
16 taking advantage of Warden's initiative of the
17 Department Heads starting and then the employees
18 are hearing about it and joining in as well.

19 So thank you.

20 WARDEN WINGARD: Thanks, Karen. We
21 also are going to -- the position we hired that I
22 thought the Board would be interested in is Gary
23 Copeland, who is going to be our new Population
24 Manager. He starts next pay period, I believe.
25 Gary is going to focus on working with all the

1 stakeholders, courts, especially Probation,
2 everybody in the facility to look, you know, at a
3 different maybe critical eye of our population,
4 where it's going, why it's going in one direction
5 or the other, and we're looking forward to having
6 someone in the facility that can coordinate
7 everything around population management. We've
8 been talking about it on and off for a while.
9 You guys probably have been talking about it
10 since COVID and watching it slowly go in one
11 direction, so bringing Gary on, we're hoping that
12 we will be able to report back to you all in a
13 few months with what he's finding and why maybe
14 the population is going in the direction that
15 it's going. So Mr. Copeland will be coming on
16 next pay period.

17 We created a process of trying to
18 engage the media more at the facility, and our
19 Public Information Officers are starting to
20 contact them and tell them about the stories that
21 are going on in the facility. A newsletter,
22 we've sent it out to all the media contacts.
23 Some of them jumped on some of the stories; some
24 of them not. That's fine. It's not necessarily
25 going to be a monthly newsletter. It's going to

1 be as we can get enough stories, we're going to
2 continue to push them out to all the local media
3 outlets to tell some of the things that we're
4 doing at the facility.

5 That's all I have for now.

6 **DEPUTY WARDENS' REPORT**

7 DEPUTY WARDEN CLARK: Good
8 afternoon, Board. For Foundation of Hope, I just
9 wanted to remind everyone that the Foundation of
10 Hope is continuing to accept book donations for
11 the jail's library, so anyone that's interested
12 in donating soft-back books, please go to the
13 Foundation of Hope's website. The next book
14 donation is scheduled for August 11th.

15 The Foundation of Hope, as part of
16 our reentry services expansion has also begun
17 resource and activities coordination services in
18 the jail. They've started activities-based
19 programming on several pods and will continue to
20 expand that as their staffing increases.

21 In addition, the resource
22 coordination that they're doing helps support
23 library services in the jail, and they've begun
24 to catalog the jail's library and accept requests
25 from the incarcerated population for specific

1 books. So these services will all continue to
2 expand in the coming months, and we're excited
3 for this new initiative.

4 For our Reentry Services, Ethel,
5 who was our first dog at the facility, was
6 adopted on July 14th. Blaze, a husky, arrived at
7 the facility. Blaze arrived underweight, and the
8 handlers worked with him to get him some
9 additional weight that he needs, and adoption is
10 in the works for Blaze. So we're excited about
11 that.

12 On July 23rd, we expanded the Tales
13 Program with a second dog whose name is Max. Max
14 is a mixed-breed dog who is full of energy and
15 also in line to be adopted. So we are in talks
16 with Animal Friends about a new bonded pair of
17 dogs that should be coming to us next week,
18 assuming all goes well with these adoptions.

19 The jail hosted a ribbon-cutting
20 ceremony for the book vending machine on
21 July 21st. We'd like to thank the Allegheny
22 County Library Association for their
23 extraordinary partnership on this, and Senator
24 Lindsay Williams and Jay Costa for providing us
25 with the opportunity to be the first location in

1 Allegheny County to have a book vending machine.
2 The children visiting the jail really have
3 enjoyed the opportunity to take home a free book.

4 I'd also like to acknowledge and
5 thank Councilwoman Bethany Hallam and Jail Board
6 Liaison Karen Duffola for their attendance at
7 that special event and for your continued
8 support.

9 That concludes this month's report
10 for Programs. Deputy Warden Martin doesn't have
11 anything to report today, so we can take
12 questions at this time.

13 MS. INNAMORATO: Questions?

14 MS. HALLAM: Can I?

15 MS. INNAMORATO: Member Hallam?

16 MS. HALLAM: Oh, sure. I'll go
17 first.

18 All right. So first question -- I
19 only have a few. First question, Warden, you
20 spoke about the Population Manager, but I think
21 that is a way bigger deal than the time that it
22 was given, so I'm just wondering -- I've been
23 noticing, of course, the population going up. I
24 don't think it's taken a dip since COVID, and so
25 I'm just wondering what's the plan for that,

1 especially with the open alternative housing
2 beds? Like, is that a coordination between
3 Court, alternative housing, who's all involved,
4 and what will that population manager be doing?
5 And can I meet him when he comes on?

6 WARDEN WINGARD: Sure. We'll bring
7 him up.

8 MS. HALLAM: Okay.

9 WARDEN WINGARD: So I mean, Deputy
10 Clark may jump in, but my understanding is we are
11 screening everybody at the facility for
12 alternative housing. We have staff down there
13 who do that, and then ultimately the judge will
14 decide if they can go to alternative housing. I
15 don't -- I think I heard they had several empty
16 beds but we're working every day. There's
17 someone screening these folks every day to get
18 them to alternative housing, but I believe that
19 the Courts still have the final decision.

20 I've seen an uptick since I got
21 here. In January, I think it was around 1,650.
22 Today's population is 1,900, so if you add in
23 alternative housing, we're over 2,000 right now,
24 which is concerning, obviously. We don't want to
25 have to open more pods, if we don't have to, that

1 are closed. We are looking every day to move the
2 people who are sentenced to State sentences and
3 people who are sentenced to Federal sentences,
4 moving them out as quickly as possible. That's
5 what we can control.

6 The other parts of the population
7 we may not be able to control at the jail, so
8 we're looking forward to Gary coming on board and
9 working with Probation, working with the Courts,
10 to hopefully have a very pointed conversation
11 about why this population is going up.

12 I mean, some people told me in
13 summer months here in Pittsburgh, it does go up.
14 There is an uptick. I don't know that. I wasn't
15 here. I did look at the numbers over the last
16 couple of years. There's been a little bit of an
17 increase during the summer months, but right now,
18 it feels like we're moving in the wrong
19 direction.

20 MS. HALLAM: Thank you for that.
21 I'm very, very excited about this. I know this
22 was one of the things that you talked about when
23 you first came onboard really wanting to focus
24 on. And so I appreciate it happening.

25 The next question I have is I've

1 gotten a lot of complaints from specifically
2 attorney friends who are noting whether it's a
3 shift in policy or just something has changed, an
4 inconsistency among a policy for the incarcerated
5 people when they are meeting with their
6 attorneys. They're no longer being allowed to
7 bring, like, anything with them at all, legal
8 paperwork, things to go over with their attorney.
9 And so I know we've talked about this before so
10 I'm just wondering if you can provide an update
11 about that policy and how we're ensuring
12 compliance amongst all shifts.

13 WARDEN WINGARD: Sure. That was
14 a -- probably a miscommunication which I take
15 responsibility for. There is a policy at the
16 jail, and it may be, or may -- may or may not
17 have been completely followed to the T. And so
18 we're readdressing that policy.

19 In the meantime, we contacted the
20 Public Defenders. We contacted Mr. Perkins and
21 everyone else who comes to the jail to tell them
22 that it is okay to do what they were doing. So
23 there was a few days that that was an issue, but
24 we redirected that it was okay for them to do
25 that. But we are going to look at that policy

1 with input from those folks.

2 MS. HALLAM: Awesome. And if
3 someone has that problem now, going to visit a
4 client and they're not being allowed to bring
5 anything, who should they report it to? Should
6 they just tell us, and we tell you? Like, what's
7 the best way that you prefer folks go about that
8 if it continues?

9 WARDEN WINGARD: Yeah, and the
10 Chief has worked with a lot of the different
11 lawyers and attorneys on this. So they can
12 contact him.

13 MS. HALLAM: Awesome. I know a lot
14 of people that will be really excited to hear
15 that. So thank you for that.

16 My next question is about -- it has
17 been so hot out, and I just know we've had issues
18 with the HVAC system in the past. Wondering if
19 there has been any abnormalities with the air
20 conditioning on any of the pods?

21 WARDEN WINGARD: It was 90 in our
22 office last week.

23 MS. HALLAM: Your office? I also
24 am concerned about that, but like kind of after
25 this.

1 WARDEN WINGARD: I'm sure you are.

2 I'm sure you are.

3 MS. HALLAM: Yeah.

4 WARDEN WINGARD: No. We haven't
5 had a lot of complaints. When there is -- the
6 humidity is up, there's issues. We are putting
7 fans in. We're issuing extra water to everybody
8 when that happens. Two weeks ago, when the
9 humidity and the temperatures were up, we took
10 those provisions.

11 This week, with the humidity down,
12 it seems to really go with humidity, but as of
13 now, we're not getting any complaints about
14 specific areas.

15 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And is there,
16 like, some sort of regular check? Like, is that
17 part of like the guards' rounds is taking
18 temperature on the pod?

19 WARDEN WINGARD: We'll hear from
20 the corrections officers when it's --

21 MS. HALLAM: Because they're hot,
22 too, right?

23 WARDEN WINGARD: They're in there.
24 The officers are in those same pods, so we'll
25 hear from them when there's an issue.

1 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And then last
2 question I have is regarding Hep-C and HIV
3 testing, whether that happens for everyone that
4 comes in the jail. If not, who is it happening
5 for? And then follow up to that will be what
6 those treatments look like?

7 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: So everybody
8 that comes into the jail gets offered HIV and STD
9 testing, like, right from the gate. So at
10 Intake, you can produce a urine. That will be
11 sent off for STD testing. If you want the HIV
12 testing, we draw labs when you get upstairs.
13 That all goes through the Health Department.

14 If you want to request Hepatitis-C
15 testing, we have rapid tests that we just
16 acquired, and we started like a really small soft
17 launch on that. So once we get that process more
18 in place, we would like to expand that more to
19 the Intake population as well. But that's just
20 where the testing is for the Hepatitis.

21 For treatment, if you are on HIV
22 meds, you'll get them continued. If you need to
23 start on HIV meds, not a problem. And we also
24 offer prep for, you know, any of those
25 precautions.

1 For the Hepatitis, if you are
2 currently on treatment on the street, we will get
3 that continued, but reaching out to the pharmacy
4 that you get those through and get those
5 delivered into the jail.

6 Starting Hepatitis-C treatment is
7 not in the works yet, but we do make referrals to
8 anybody who may need it to our River Clinic
9 partners.

10 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So it is all of
11 those things, STD, HIV, Hep-C, all voluntary
12 testing?

13 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: Yeah.

14 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And then HIV
15 testing isn't offered until you get upstairs. So
16 folks who are just --

17 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: It is
18 offered in Intake.

19 MS. HALLAM: Okay.

20 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: And then if
21 you want it, we just get you scheduled into our
22 lab to get the blood drawn.

23 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And if you
24 don't go upstairs, there's just not time and it's
25 not happening?

1 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: All those
2 questions you'd ask in Processing so you're going
3 to be going upstairs at that point.

4 MS. HALLAM: Cool. And is
5 something -- is it something that you're like
6 thinking about? And do we call it induction when
7 it's Hep-C testing just like we did for --

8 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: Sure.

9 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So is that
10 something that's, like, in the works? I just
11 realized that a lot of people -- this is the
12 first time they're being seen by a medical
13 provider maybe in a long time, and is there a way
14 we could --

15 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: So Hep-C
16 testing or treatment is a very costly medication
17 and is honestly one of the most difficult things
18 that a lot of jails across the country face is
19 trying to start treatment on. But that's why we
20 partnered with -- like with the River Clinic to
21 get them follow-up immediately afterwards. It's
22 just a -- it's a tough medication to get your
23 hands on.

24 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And the River
25 Clinic is who you're referring people to, like,

1 once they leave, if they're going to need
2 treatment?

3 DEPUTY WARDEN CLARK: Yeah. It's
4 the clinic. Sometimes they have a van parked
5 outside --

6 MS. HALLAM: Yeah, I know.

7 DEPUTY WARDEN MARTIN: -- of the
8 jail and all that stuff, yeah.

9 MS. HALLAM: Awesome. Thank you
10 very, very much.

11 MS. INNAMORATO: Member Man-E.

12 MAN-E: I have a couple questions.
13 One is a follow-up question about something that
14 you already discussed about the AC. We've
15 received personal complaints about 4-C
16 specifically. Maybe on like the hot humidity
17 days is that a pod that you receive complaints
18 about?

19 WARDEN WINGARD: Several, but 4-C
20 is one of them.

21 MAN-E: Okay.

22 WARDEN WINGARD: Among other pods,
23 but 4-C is one of them when it's really hot out.

24 MAN-E: I gotcha. But like as of
25 now, it's cool, though, right?

1 WARDEN WINGARD: As of today, I
2 have -- we received no complaints. I haven't.

3 MAN-E: All right. I gotcha.

4 All right. So my main question is
5 a personnel issue, and of course, I understand if
6 there's some details you're not at liberty to
7 discuss, but because it's been public information
8 for the past two weeks now about that viral video
9 that came out, that CO Brian Davis, said very,
10 very hurtful and disturbing things, I do have to
11 give, you know, credit where it's due. I'm a fan
12 of that. He was immediately suspended and, of
13 course, that was reported on the news.

14 But I haven't seen or heard any
15 updates since. Are you able to provide any
16 updates on what's happened with him?

17 WARDEN WINGARD: He no longer works
18 for the County.

19 MAN-E: All right. Appreciate
20 that. I'm happy to hear that. What does that
21 process look like whenever situations like this
22 arise?

23 WARDEN WINGARD: I'd prefer not to
24 talk about that in this forum. I can just tell
25 you he's no longer working for the County.

1 MAN-E: Okay. I gotcha. One last
2 question. And, of course, you know, I understand
3 if you prefer not to talk about it, will there be
4 any review of any complaints that were made about
5 him, and specifically by any of the incarcerated?

6 WARDEN WINGARD: I believe we
7 already started looking into that.

8 MAN-E: Okay.

9 WARDEN WINGARD: After the incident
10 was brought to our attention.

11 MAN-E: All right. Thank you.

12 WARDEN WINGARD: You're welcome.

13 MS. INNAMORATO: Okay. Thank you,
14 Members, for your questions.

15 And Man-E, just to talk a little
16 bit about the HR process, if there is something
17 that is brought to our attention like what
18 happened with Brian Davis, you know, there's a
19 review. There's a determination on whether they
20 are suspended with or without pay. There's an
21 internal investigation, and then, you know, what
22 this investigation found is that termination was
23 the best path forward for that individual.

24 So that's generally how it works.

25 MAN-E: Thank you. I appreciate

1 that.

2 MS. INNAMORATO: And I don't have
3 any questions. So with that, thank you all for
4 your updates, your reports. We will move to
5 Public Comment on general matters.

6 **PUBLIC COMMENT**

7 MS. INNAMORATO: And first up is
8 Brandi Fisher, who signed up early and online,
9 which you can do. What's the website?

10 MS. HALLAM: I just Google Jail
11 Oversight, and you can sign up to give Public
12 Comment that way.

13 MS. INNAMORATO: Oh, yes. You can
14 do that. I did see that.

15 MS. FISHER: Good evening,
16 everyone. I know I haven't been here in a while.
17 I've been grateful for that, and I wanted to
18 first thank Man-E -- I'm sorry. I can say Man-E,
19 for, you know, bringing up the incident with
20 Brian Davis, because I wanted to echo your
21 sentiments to the County for the way they handled
22 the situation so quickly, promptly, and how they
23 were very responsive, which didn't need advocacy
24 done. So thank you, thank you, thank you.

25 I'm here today with deep concerns

1 about the incarceration and treatment of an
2 18-year-old young man by the name of Seven Rule
3 (phonetic) who is currently being detained in the
4 Allegheny County Jail. Mr. Rule has been in
5 custody without bail since June 26th.
6 Shockingly, his arraignments are not scheduled
7 until August 22nd and September 15th, up to
8 81 days after his arrest, and I have grave
9 concerns about these delays. I know that's not
10 in your control, but I wanted to make sure I echo
11 that.

12 But even more disturbing is
13 Mr. Rule's account of being violently assaulted
14 by multiple correctional officers. He reports
15 being punched repeatedly, stomped on, stabbed
16 with keys, and left with a broken jaw, damaged
17 ribs, and lasting injuries, all after a vape pen
18 reportedly fell from his hair during a search.
19 Rather than receiving continuing medical care and
20 protection, Mr. Rule had been placed in solitary
21 confinement, further endangering the physical and
22 mental health -- his physical and mental health.

23 An officer's own report, which is
24 Mr. DiAngelo, admits to using force, raising
25 serious questions about the jail's protocols and

1 accountability. It appears to be excessive.

2 In our opinion, he was also
3 transported to Allegheny Hospital -- Allegheny
4 General Hospital, so his injuries were severe
5 enough to be transported to the hospital, but
6 when he came back, he was not placed on any
7 medical pod. He was placed in RHU, which is not
8 supposed to be used for Disciplinary Actions at
9 all according to the law that was passed.

10 So I just wanted to bring this to
11 your attention. I will be sending you an e-mail
12 which will be detailed. I also will be including
13 the Warden on that, who I plan to ask to meet
14 with soon.

15 And I received several calls about
16 this from inside the jail and people outside the
17 jail. So he had a lot of people advocating for
18 him and trying to get him help, even all the way
19 from Texas. So that's why I'm here to talk about
20 this today, and hoping that he can be removed
21 from RHU immediately and placed in a safe
22 environment where he is getting medical care, as
23 he is still complaining about his ribs hurting
24 and his shoulder being in pain.

25 He is currently on a soft food diet

1 because he cannot eat because of his jaw being
2 broken. He was -- it was told to us that he was
3 on a hunger strike, which was not true. He said
4 he was never striking. He could not eat because
5 he was struck. So if I could get a response to
6 this and response to our e-mail that I'll be
7 sending, the letter, I would appreciate it. I
8 just wanted it on record, and that's why I came
9 here today.

10 Thank you. And thank you again for
11 firing Brian Davis.

12 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you. Next
13 up, Chief Makina.

14 MS. MAKINA: Good evening. Now, I
15 would like to thank you all for hearing my
16 reflections of the Allegheny County Jail. Now,
17 either I'm just crazy or we have a public health
18 crisis linked to the address known as -- I'm
19 sorry, linked to the address known as
20 950 Second Avenue, the Allegheny County Jail.

21 How many more people have to die
22 before a complete overhaul or shutdown of this
23 facility takes place? You simply can't afford to
24 keep allowing the culture at this jail to
25 continue with their "business as usual"

1 philosophy.

2 Allegheny County Jail has one of
3 the highest death rates in this country. You
4 can't sit back and do nothing about this. Again,
5 I echo the sentiments of Brandi Fisher. Thank
6 you for firing and not just suspending
7 Brian Davis, but he isn't the only one that feels
8 this way. It's a culture that's practiced at the
9 Allegheny County Jail.

10 We, the people, call for
11 rehabilitation of this facility. He's obviously
12 not the only person who is violating the code of
13 ethics at this facility. People are put into
14 what is known as a turtle suit. It's a green
15 suit.

16 Whether you're complaining about
17 your head hurting or needing medication that you
18 weren't able to take with you on this journey to
19 jail -- and people are told, oh, well. I have a
20 first-hand account of such behaviors.

21 Something has to be done. We do
22 have a new warden, and so far, one person has
23 died on your watch in March of just this year.
24 That alone alludes to the fact that it's not the
25 warden that's the problem; it's the COs who are

1 in charge of monitoring people. They simply just
2 don't care. I've witnessed personally, myself,
3 an elderly woman, who was in jail, who couldn't
4 hear and also couldn't see, and then she was
5 penalized for not following instructions that she
6 probably had no idea about the code or how she
7 was to conduct herself in those situations.
8 Something more has to be done. We can't keep
9 being the number one jail in the country that
10 allows people to die inside of jails. Death by
11 incarceration should not be these people's
12 sentence.

13 Thank you.

14 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you. Next
15 up is John Kenstowicz.

16 MS. HALLAM: Point of personal
17 privilege, Chair Innamorato.

18 MS. INNAMORATO: Member Hallam.

19 MS. HALLAM: Yeah. I just --
20 before this next public speaker goes, I just want
21 to make sure everyone on the Board is aware that
22 over the weekend, Mr. Kenstowicz sent numerous --
23 numerous e-mails to this Board filled with racial
24 slurs.

25 After the first instance, Man-E

1 responded and said please do not use that
2 language towards me, or ever and he continued to
3 do it in two more e-mails after that using very
4 explicitly the full N word in e-mails. And I
5 know County Council President sent him a letter
6 today telling him that he is not allowed to do
7 that, telling him not to say that word in Public
8 Comment in Council meetings, but I would just
9 like to remind him not to use that word tonight
10 or you will be removed from this meeting.

11 Thank you.

12 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you, Member
13 Hallam.

14 Mr. Kenstowicz, your three minutes
15 has begun.

16 MR. KENSTOWICZ: Okay. I'll
17 respond to that at the end, okay?

18 Our petition not to reinstate leg
19 restraints on hospital runs is creating a wide
20 coalition of our officers, our healthcare staff,
21 our friends in public safety, our firefighters,
22 our police, our sheriffs, our paramedics, some
23 advocates for the rights of our residents, and
24 the public.

25 I've set up a table in our jail

1 parking lot for six days, obtained 265 signatures
2 of registered voters. At each of the three shift
3 changes, each day from our officers, healthcare
4 staff, and our office staff, engaging, learning,
5 building relationships in supporting our
6 frontline staff. It was wonderful meeting new
7 staff and reengaging with staff I've known for
8 years.

9 We are working as a team with
10 officers going to fire stations, police stations,
11 and EMS stations, describing the risk to our
12 public, our residents, and our officers without
13 leg restraints in emergency rooms, and getting a
14 lot of support and signatures from our public
15 safety friends. Not one individual has said to
16 me that they were aware of the 2022 referendum at
17 the time of voting regarding the leg shackles.
18 How could this be? The leg shackles were not on
19 the November 2021 ballot. The word was used one
20 percent of the time on the petition statement.
21 Voters seen the petition statement, thought they
22 were voting to stop solitary confinement. Even
23 WPXI did their own study of the petition
24 statement, citing the significant lack of almost
25 any information about the leg shackles. Working

1 at the facts, it is clear the majority of voters
2 did not know what they were voting for regarding
3 the leg shackles.

4 Let's move on. Our Sheriffs will
5 shackle everyone on hospital runs if provided the
6 contract. Our initiative excludes pregnant
7 females, residents with certain health
8 conditions, and residents who do not pose a risk
9 of escape or to hurt themselves or someone else.

10 Our initiative is much more humane
11 than using the Sheriff's option, and as a result
12 of, we have been obtaining signatures from
13 different advocates for our residents.

14 After this meeting, I will be
15 available for anyone who wants to be more
16 informed about our initiative and sign our
17 petition.

18 So with what time I have left, I
19 want to respond to what Ms. Hallam said. Okay, I
20 received a text on Sunday, which was incredibly
21 demeaning and used racial slurs.

22 MS. INNAMORATO: Your time is up.

23 MR. KENSTOWICZ: Okay.

24 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yay.

25 MS. INNAMORATO: Next up is someone

1 who we hear is celebrating a birthday and a major
2 milestone, year 100.

3 AUDIENCE MEMBER: (Cheering and
4 applause.)

5 MS. INNAMORATO: Ms. Marion Damick.

6 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: (Singing Happy
7 Birthday.)

8 MS. DAMICK: I'm glad to be back.
9 But I've known this jail before it was a jail. I
10 was part of the people who went down a typed --
11 and started as a jail. And before, you wouldn't
12 believe what we did before. It was awful.

13 MS. INNAMORATO: You're saying
14 wonderful things but come to the mic.

15 MS. DAMICK: Okay.

16 MS. INNAMORATO: Everybody wants to
17 hear you, even the people at home.

18 MS. DAMICK: Okay. All right. I
19 know the jail. I helped set up the thing for the
20 jail, from what it was, which was awful. I had a
21 private driveway -- I mean, parking spot, and I'd
22 meet with the warden and everybody. Truly, I was
23 with ACLU at that time -- and also from a lady
24 with Prison Society, but mostly with the ACLU and
25 saw how this jail blew -- blew up. You know it

1 was -- it used to be in the basement of the jail
2 for the meetings, your meetings here. We met
3 there for years, and it was truly very
4 interesting because one thing, you got to go into
5 the jail, and you saw what was there and what
6 wasn't there. And that really, I think, was very
7 helpful, if not very important, very helpful.
8 You're sitting here. You really don't know, if
9 you haven't been around, what is in the jail or
10 what isn't in the jail and what it's like. That,
11 I don't think we could get back to it, but I
12 thought that really was important, and so I've --
13 yeah -- it's the perfect -- so I know what was
14 in -- what the jail was like before it was here.
15 I know what it's like when I was working for
16 going -- for Prison Society and ACLU,
17 particularly ACLU, every chance mentioned. And
18 that -- we had meetings down here in the jail --
19 in the courthouse, but in one of the small rooms.
20 Everybody was all cooped together, and someone
21 gave out notes for places to go.

22 It's a change, and you should try
23 to realize how much you have gained since when it
24 started. Of course, I will say it was years ago.
25 And I'd like to see it continue to improve

1 because it improved from when I was young, 100
2 years ago. My God, 100.

3 AUDIENCE MEMBER: (Applause.)

4 MS. DAMICK: It wasn't 100 years
5 ago. I had to grow up first. You really ought
6 to look at it in a different way and see what can
7 help, what can improve in small ways. Everything
8 can improve in small ways, gets bigger and it
9 really makes the work efficient. And try -- the
10 idea of a jail is to make people better than they
11 were when they came in the door.

12 MS. INNAMORATO: Yes.

13 MS. DAMICK: And that is something
14 I think we sometimes forget, and we should
15 remember. That's the purpose of being in jail.
16 We think of it as punishment, but you know, when
17 having children -- when you punish, you really
18 have to look at what you're saying to the kids.
19 And that's what they'll remember. And I think we
20 really have to keep that in mind.

21 Everybody, I think they will --
22 fingers crossed, I will too.

23 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you, Marion.
24 And you show us all that using your voice and
25 being an advocate, you know, maybe that helps you

1 live to be 100. It keeps you young, so thank you
2 for lending your voice and your wisdom to all of
3 us over the years. Thank you, thank you.

4 Up next, we have John Bolanos.

5 MR. BOLANOS: I was just going to
6 announce her birthday.

7 MS. INNAMORATO: Oh, do you want to
8 give any remarks?

9 MR. BOLANOS: Just a comment from
10 the Prison Society that she inspires all of us.

11 MS. INNAMORATO: Wonderful. Thank
12 you, John.

13 Up next, Sharon Bonavoglia.

14 MS. BONAVOGLIA: You got to be
15 careful.

16 MS. INNAMORATO: I know. Don't
17 shun me.

18 MS. BONAVOGLIA: All right. We at
19 PIIN are anxiously awaiting the results of the
20 study conducted concerning the monthly \$125
21 payments to each of the residents of the jail.
22 This money is coming from them, and their friends
23 and families, who help to support them in paying
24 the high prices for commissary items, phone
25 calls, and enhanced tablet use. This is a

1 justice issue, and we encourage the JOB to do all
2 in your power to keep these payments in place at
3 the current amount.

4 We also continue to challenge both
5 Judge Bigley and Judge Evashavik to use the
6 authority in their own courtrooms, as well as
7 their influence with their peers to drastically
8 reduce the population in the jail by lifting
9 detainers that are keeping hardworking taxpaying
10 citizens behind bars where they are, instead,
11 losing their jobs, homes, cars, and even access
12 to their children.

13 Both of these judges also have the
14 power to provide access to empty beds at Renewal
15 and other alternative housing, and all of this
16 means that jail staffing issues might not be as
17 severe because population would be decreased.

18 I am thrilled, thrilled Warden
19 Wingard, to hear about the new hire and the work
20 that can be done to reduce the population at the
21 jail.

22 I also just want to say, from the
23 Pennsylvania Interfaith Impact Network, happy
24 birthday. And, you know, tragically, I also now
25 would like people to rise for the reading of the

1 names of those families who celebrate birthdays
2 without the people that were born on those days.

3 Richard Lenhart, Robert Blake,
4 Cody Still, Daniel Pastorek, John Brady,
5 Martin Bucek, Robert Harper, Vinckley Harris,
6 Justin Brady, Paul Allen, Roger Millspaugh,
7 Paul Spisak, Gerald Thomas, Jerry Lee Ross, Jr.,
8 Victor Joseph Zilinek, Ronald Andrus,
9 Anthony Talotta, William Spencer,
10 James Washington, Damon Leroy Kayes, Tim Manino,
11 Douglas Bonomo, Zachary Sahm, Nicole Baruffi,
12 Richard Sciubba, II, Terrance Clowney,
13 Tracey Hickey and Justin McCullough.

14 MS. INNAMORATO: Dr. Fisher.

15 DR. FISHER: I'm Dr. Stephen
16 Fischer. S-T-E-P-H-E-N, Stephen; F-I-S-H-E-R,
17 Fisher.

18 Happy birthday, Marion. I was
19 thrilled to hear Marion echoing the exact words
20 used by our new warden at the time he came here,
21 the notion that the jail is here -- the people
22 would be better when they get out than when they
23 got in, almost echoing the phrasing. Really,
24 really encouraging. I've seen that happen. I
25 had someone tell me I'm visiting in a neighboring

1 jail in Butler County. I wasn't arrested. I was
2 rescued. I'm so glad I'm here in retrospect.
3 Unfortunately, it didn't turn out in the end so
4 well for that guy, but for part of the time, he
5 was in jail there was a clear direction or
6 improvement from being there in that adjacent
7 facility.

8 I was somewhat disappointed that in
9 reading the names of those who died, I had a year
10 of experience full-time at the Western Penn
11 before it was closed down as a physician, and I'm
12 also board-certified in addiction medicine, and I
13 know three of the names that were just read
14 personally. That discourages me a little bit.
15 One of them I have called before and will call
16 again, the widow, to tell -- so she can tell her
17 teenage son her dad was prayed for. We're hoping
18 that really, really will change.

19 I don't know exactly -- I've made
20 some suggestions here that haven't always been
21 very spiral, like providing more money for -- and
22 there's no way to do that. I'm so grateful that
23 things are going in a positive direction. I'm
24 really thrilled to be here in a much more
25 positive atmosphere. I don't have a positive

1 suggestion right now except if we're listening to
2 people in the community, that's got to be a plus.

3 Thanks. I wish I had something
4 better prepared to say. Thank you.

5 MS. INNAMORATO: Thank you.

6 Jacqueline Lide.

7 AUDIENCE MEMBER: I don't have
8 anything.

9 MS. INNAMORATO: Oh, okay. Sounds
10 good.

11 That concludes Public Comment. And
12 before we adjourn, I would like to make an
13 announcement. Did I miss anyone else who signed
14 up?

15 (No response.)

16 MS. INNAMORATO: So because we do
17 not have a quorum this evening, we do have to
18 vote on the payments from the IIWF, so there will
19 be a meeting, a voting meeting open to the public
20 on August 20th at noon here in the Gold Room and
21 we'll make sure that that information is posted
22 online as well.

23 Any other announcements from
24 members?

25 MS. HALLAM: I think that's it.

1 **ADJOURNMENT**

2 MS. INNAMORATO: Okay. Do I have a
3 Motion to adjourn?

4 MS. HALLAM: So moved.

5 MAN-E: Second.

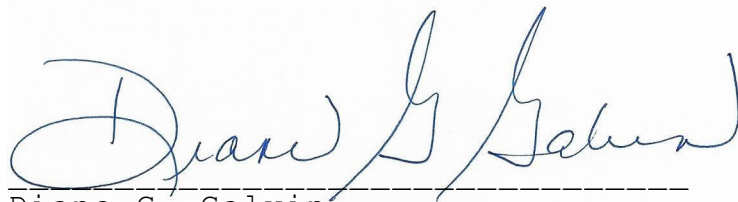

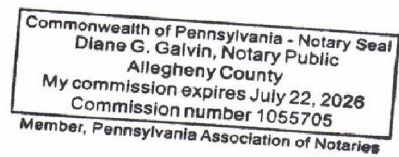
